As restrictions begin to ease please make sure you only meet others in permitted circumstances and follow the government COVID rules in order to keep our community safe. Thank you.




## Pre-School

This term, we have been looking at new life. The children have investigated eggs and discussed what could have been inside. We have discussed the changes we are seeing in the environment and the children have created some amazing still life paintings using daffodils.



## Foundation



Foundation Stage have been learning about Pets. In literacy, they have been reading lots of different stories such as Dear Zoo, Mog and FunnyBones. Every day the children have been writing independently. The teachers are very proud of how well they are applying their phonics to write simple sentences. Children have also started writing Super Sentences during the morning activity for the chance to wear the Superhero cape for a day.



In maths, they have been learning about teen numbers to 15 and using equipment to represent them. The children have really enjoyed being back in school with all their friends.

It has been wonderful to have everyone back!




## Year 1



Year 1, in maths have been solving problems involving length, height, mass, and weight. We have been measuring using rulers and comparing the measurements of objects using the words; long, longer, and longest. We have continued to improve our maths fluency through using the Numbots app .

The children have been enjoying the superhero topic this term. We have learnt about the real-life heroes, Florence Nightingale and Mary Seacole. We have considered these heroes in relation to their historical significance and the impact they have had on hospitals today. In science, we have learnt the names of our body parts and the super senses associated with them!

In our writing we have been adding suffixes to words. We have used -ed to write in the past tense and -s or -es to make plurals. We have been working really hard on our letter formation and most of the children are getting neater and neater!




## Year 2


Year 2 have really enjoyed their Secret Garden topic. They have been learning about plants and this was linked to the story of Jack and the Beanstalk. The children changed the ending of another story, Jim and the Beanstalk using their creative minds to think about what might have happened!

The children have become very knowledgeable about plants and know what helps them to grow. They have planted a variety of seeds and are looking forward to seeing what grows! This week they have imagined what it would feel like to be a seed.

Using their senses, they have written an explanation text using lots of adverbs, similes and conjunctions.



In Maths we have been looking at 2D and 3D shapes. They have learnt about lines of symmetry and really enjoyed finding the lines of symmetry in things around them.



This half term our learning began online with our new topic "Tribal Tales" in which Year 3 have explored Britain's prehistoric past. In History we have investigated the changes that occurred between the Stone Age, the Bronze Age and the Iron Age; in lifestyles, homes, clothing, food and the use of tools. In our online English learning, we learned the story of "The Freedom Bird" so we could retell it orally, then we created our own stories based around it set during the Ice Age! In maths we have been looking at measuring length, converting between meters and centimetres and centimetres and millimetres, and this week have started looking at money and how we add, subtract and convert units of money in everyday life! Since returning back to school the children have been very enthusiastic about their blended learning and the chance to do some of their work using the new laptops in school! Online TT Rockstars challenges are becoming very competitive!



## Year 3

Year 4's topic this half term is Potions. We have been working on including similes, expanded noun phrases and inverted commas in our narrative retells of Harry Potter. Alongside this, Year 4 have been exploring solids, liquids and gases and how these states of matter can change. The children have also been enjoying their Blended Learning sessions and using the new laptops to retrieve knowledge we've taught previously in the year.

## Year 4

Some children have also enjoyed tag-rugby lessons with a coach from Leicester Tigers Rugby Club. During these sessions, groups have developed strategies to pass and move with the ball while working as a team.



## Year 5

We have been really impressed with the way Year 5 have coped with their remote learning this term, and the way they have returned to being in the classroom.

In English, the children have learnt the poem 'Leisure' by W H Davies, off by heart. They used actions to help remember the different parts of the poem and they had lots of fun performing it. We also had World Book Day in March, so we enjoyed talking about and sharing our favourite books; we wrote book reviews to recommend books we had enjoyed reading. We are currently reading 'Bloom' by Nicola Skinner, as our class text, and the children are loving listening to this exciting and imaginative story. During the lockdown, Year 5 have also been introduced to MyON, an online reading resource. They have been able to access over 5000 new books which cover a huge range of genres – there's something for everyone!

In maths, the children have been working hard to understand different units of measurement and how to convert between units. During online learning, the children developed their mathematical understanding using Century and this is something we will continue to use within the classroom. Year 5 have also been learning about fractions, including equivalent fractions, mixed numbers and improper fractions. Times Tables are crucial

for fractions lesson so they are continuing to work hard on their fluency using Times Table Rock Stars.




In Science, we have been learning about living things. We learnt about the parts of a flower and how they reproduce. We have learnt about seed dispersal in plants. We have also been learning about the lifecycles of different animals including mammals, insects, amphibians and birds.

Back at school, Year 5 have completed their first two Latin lessons. This is the first time we have learnt Latin and we have started by looking at the origins of words and how Latin has transferred into English. We have been looking at Latin root words and how we use them in English today.

## Year 6


Year 6 have been very excited to be all back at school and seeing all their friends! This term, Year 6's topic has been 'Darwin's Delights'. In Science, we have been learning about fossils, inheritance, evolution and adaptation. We have very much enjoyed looking at how fossils have been made and what we can learn from them.

This term, we have also started Latin! We have had lots of discussion about the history of the English language, where it came from and how history has affected it. We have been learning how our language links to Latin and how we can understand lots of other languages by learning Latin.



In Maths, we have had some new learning: percentages! We used our Latin knowledge to know that 'per' means out of and 'cent' means 100; this knowledge helps us to understand and problem solve using percentages.

We have been reading 'Kensuke's Kingdom' by Michael Morpurgo and have very much enjoyed it. We are using our class text in our English lessons this term and we are looking forward to writing about our own island story!



We are also very proud of Luke for walking every day to raise money for the Great Ormond Street Hospital- well done Luke!

We were also ranked 1<sup>st</sup> place overall in the Oadby and Wigston area. Well done to all children in Key Stage 2 for taking part in the challenge, and congratulations to all of our winners who should've received their certificate.

This term we've taken part in three more virtual challenges, some children even took part at home during lockdown! Key Stage 1 and 2 had a go at the Boccia challenge, a target game using beanbags and hoops. Sitting in a chair pupils had to throw the beanbags and land them as close to the middle of the target as they could. Again, we had some great individual scores and we also ranked 1<sup>st</sup> place for overall entries in Oadby & Wigston which is fantastic!

Still ongoing this month is the Activity Tracker Challenge, all children should have received an activity tracker earlier in the term for recording each 20 minutes of physical activity that they've done. Children can log any physical activity that they do in PE, break & lunch time and outside of school on the tracker (colour in one icon every 20 minutes of activity). Once participants reach bronze, silver & gold activity milestones, they receive a certificate and points towards their Quad Cup area total (Bronze = 1pt, Silver = 3pts, Gold = 5pts). We look forward to finding out how we've done after Easter.

Finally, some Key Stage 2 classes have also had a go at the Virtual Rugby Challenge over the last few weeks. This challenge has ran alongside the Six Nations Rugby Championship currently taking place. The challenge has consisted of a running relay and a passing relay. We've had lots of quick times so far, so hopefully after Easter we'll be able to let children know their results!

## Leicester Tigers

Over the last few weeks Year 4 have been lucky enough to work with a Leicester Tigers coach during their PE sessions. Pupils have really enjoyed these sessions, developing both their physical skills and teamwork. For lots of pupils this has been their first experience of the game of rugby, hopefully it might be something they want to do again in the future!

## Beat The Street



## School Dinners

A reminder that the cost of school meals is £2.30 per day, this equates to £11.50 per week. **Please remember that school meals should be paid for in advance and debts will not be permitted.**

Pupils in EYFS and KS1 receive universal free meals. Pupils in KS2 should pay £2.30 in advance using ParentPay, unless your child is eligible for FSM. If you are not in receipt of free school meals but feel that you may be eligible, please call County Hall, on 0116 3055417 and have your National Insurance Number to hand.

## Reminders

To adhere to government guidance, we ask that **only one parent** drops-off and collects from school. We also ask that **all** visitors to the site wear a face covering and follow social distancing guidelines including not gathering at the school gate.
