Pre-School

This term the children have been extending their listening and attention skills. We have used our daily group times to play games where their listening skills are challenged. We have also introduced a new reading area for the children to have a communication friendly space for them to explore and extend their speech, language, and communication skills.



The children have also enjoyed experimenting with colour and observing the changes when they are mixed together, participating in sensory play and lots of outdoor learning.

Foundation



In EYFS this term our topic has been, Pets. Our literacy lessons have been based around stories related to pets such as, 'The Great Pet Sale', 'Mog and the V.E.T' and 'Funnybones - The Pet Shop'. We have also been singing some traditional nursery rhymes including, 'Sing a Song of Sixpence' and 'Here We Go Round The Mulberry Bush'.

We are improving our reading and writing because we have been practising our phonics every day! We have learnt some digraphs and even trigraphs. Every day we do some independent writing – writing sentences on our own – which has been challenging but we are getting better.

In maths we have been exploring the composition of numbers 6, 7 and 8 and we have continued to practice subitising numbers up to 5 (the ability to instantaneously recognise the number of objects in a small group without the need to count them).



Year 1




Year 1 have been learning about outer space and astronauts in our topic of Moon Zoom. We've also learnt about different materials, their properties and the objects that are made from these materials. We enjoyed carrying out two experiments to discover whether objects float or sink and whether they were absorbent or waterproof.



During our English we have enjoyed reading stories such as The Space Tortoise, Beegu, Way Back Home and The Smeds and The Smoos with a focus of using different punctuation marks.

In Maths we have been learning about place value within 20 and have recently moved onto addition and subtraction, using our knowledge of number bonds and tens and ones to help us be successful.





Year 2 started their new topic "Secret Garden" by learning a story called Year 2 "Emily's Bees". They really enjoyed writing the end of the story.

Did they choose a happy, sad or cliffhanger ending? The children loved learning about the language within the story - learning actions to go with some of the phrases! Ask them to show you the action for "a patchwork of fields" or "drifting in the wind" Their learning in

English was supported with a new science unit where they have been learning about living things.

They can talk at length about things that are alive, dead or have never been alive. They used the acronym MRS GREN to remind themselves of all the things a living thing needs to do to survive. They then moved on to talk about habitats and why animals and plants are suited to living there. Food chains sparked some interesting discussion about what eats what!



In maths we started to look at multiplication. The children are proficient counters in twos, tens and fives.



They can now recognize equal groups and how to use this information to solve word problems r involving multiplication. Their favourite word this half term has been "commutativity" – ask them to explain what it means! They are just beginning to learn about division, the inverse of multiplication, so they will still need to use their multiplication table facts to support their learning.

Computing has been interesting as the children learnt how to write algorithms to get a robot to find places on a map. Their left and right turns have caused some problems, but we think that their de-bugging skills are improving.

In PSHE we have been learning about the Zones of Regulation, which has been introduced across the school. The children are becoming much more aware of their feelings and how to use some of the strategies they have been taught when they need to regulate their feelings.

This term, we have learnt more about our Tribal Tales topic. We learnt about rocks, soils and fossils. We investigated the durability and density of rocks and permeability of rocks and soils

recording and analysing our data. We explored how fossils are formed and used this knowledge to create our own fossil mould.



Do you know how many types of rocks there are? Do you know how long it takes for a fossil to form?

In English, we have used oral story telling to memorise and write a version of the narrative "Mammoth's Freedom." We included in our narrative similes, inverted commas to punctuate speech , contractions and possessive apostrophes as well as our previously learnt skills.

In Maths, we have continued to use our knowledge of our times tables to multiply and divide. We have been learning to compare equations and solve related statements. We are now using partitioning and the column method to solve 2-digit by 1-digit multiplication as well as partitioning for 2-digit by 1-digit

division. So please continue to go on Times Tables Rock Star (TTRS) or Maths frame over the holidays to improve your fluency in 2's,3's,4's,5's 6's, 8's and 10's!

We have been learning all about architecture and an architect in Art.

Do you know who Martin Prince-Parrott is?

We have designed our home for the future and created a floor plan. Next, we will use oil pastels to draw a building in the style of Friedenreich Hundertwasser.

We have all enjoyed this term's learning and are trembling in anticipation for our new topic!



Year 4

This term, year 4 have been looking at multiplication and division within maths. We are so pleased that the children are using

vocabulary such as, quotient, product, multiplicand and dividend in their written reasoning. They are currently learning a range of strategies and will then establish which method is most efficient for them to use moving forward. As always, Year 4 have been drilling their times tables facts and the progress so far is phenomenal.



In English, the children have been learning skills to embed in their persuasive leaflet such as persuasive openers, rhetorical questions and the rule of 3. The children are aiming to create an insightful persuasive text to inform their readers of the impact that plastic is having on our beloved oceans which are homes to many sea creatures. We have found that the students are extremely passionate about this which is evident in their writing.



For wider curriculum, the children have been learning how to effectively group animals dependent on their characteristics. They have used Venn diagrams and classification keys to name a few. They are confidently able to distinguish between vertebrates and invertebrates as well as reptiles, birds, fish, mammals and amphibians.

We have been thrilled with how much they have engaged with this topic at home, too, seeing wonderful fact files and information leaflets that they have produced in their own time.

Year 5

Year 5 have been learning all about Chemical Changes this half term. We have read George's Marvellous Medicine by Roald


Dahl, where George (who is fed up with his grumpy Grandma) concocts a new medicine for his Grandma. We wrote our own alternative ending to this well-loved classic! In our version, Grandma turned into a zombie! Year 5 have thoroughly enjoyed this and are currently writing a set of instructions on how to survive a zombie apocalypse!



We have also investigated the lives and discoveries of famous chemists. Did you know that the wonder-drug Penicillin was actually discovered by accident in a notoriously messy laboratory?

In Science, we have been exploring both reversible and irreversible changes in solids, liquids and gases. We used our previous knowledge of electricity and built circuits to test everyday materials and their properties. Ask us about which everyday materials are insulators and which are electrically conductive!

In Maths, we learned how to measure and calculate the Perimeter and Area of rectangles and rectilinear shapes. This got a little confusing but we persevered! Currently, we are learning about Multiplication and



Division, and are using our knowledge of times tables to multiply and divide up to 4digit numbers. We will also be hosting a Year 5 TTRS battle. May the Rock Gods be with you!

Year 5 have really embraced blended learning, both in school and when children have had to isolate. Please encourage the children to take advantage of TTRS, Spelling Shed, Century and MyOn, at home.



In our topic lessons, Year 6 have been learning about **Year 6** the ancient Maya! We have found out all about this ancient civilization: how they lived, what they ate, their society and their rituals and religious beliefs. We are now learning about the geography of South America and its human and physical features.

In English and Reading, we have been reading 'The Boy at the Back of the Class' by Onjali Rauf. We have all enjoyed this book so much, as it has taught us all about different points of views and how we should do all we can to help people and be kind. We can't wait to find out what happens at the end!

In Maths, we have been learning fractions and decimals! We worked incredibly hard on learning how to multiply and divide fractions; it needed a lot of perseverance and resilience!

At Forest School we have been learning how to lash sticks together, using **Forest School News** the square and shear lashing techniques, which allows us to improve our den making skills and be able to make picture frames and shapes.

We have also learned a new team game called Giants, Wizards , Dwarves which everyone loves to play!

Excitingly, we have also been lucky enough to watch foxes run around the field.

A BIG thank you to all parents/carers for working with us at this difficult time. Since returning to school this term, we have seen a rise in the number of children absent from school due to COVID reason. We are very pleased to report that the level of absence for this reason is now falling. This is due, in part, to your diligence in following the Government guidelines, thank you.

Whole school attendance, year to date is 92.85%, which is a long way from our target level of 96%.

Please encourage and support your child to attend school every day. If you are encountering problems getting your child into school for any reason, please talk to us, we have many ways in which we can help and support families. Government guidelines regarding COVID have changed recently.

If your child received a positive COVID test result they must isolate at home for 10 days. If they are well and received a negative COVID test result on day 5 followed by a negative test on day 6 they can return to school, before the end of the 10 day period.

If there is COVID in your household, everyone in the household should take a Lateral Flow Test daily. Provided your child receives a negative COVID test result they can continue to come into school.

Covid Updates


We have had some high numbers of COVID cases since returning to school in January. Staffing shortages have certainly been a daily challenge! I would like to thank all the staff in school for their flexibility and resilience during the last few weeks. We are still following our risk assessment and ensuring rooms are well ventilated and additional cleaning is in place. Staff have continued to wear masks in communal areas due to our high COVID numbers.

Thank you to all of you who have followed our request of completing lateral flow tests. This is advice we are given when numbers in particular classes or year groups are high. It has helped to make sure children isolate when they test positive which helps to keep our community safe. Please continue to communicate COVID cases with us and do not send children to school if they have COVID symptoms.

Could we also reiterate that we would like parents to wear masks in the school grounds, particularly when waiting to collect children.

We will update all parents/carers after the half term with the latest government advise regarding Covid.

Finally, a reminder that children should be dressed appropriately for the weather. It has been a chilly start to the new term and, due to Covid, classroom windows and doors remain open. PE will also take place outside (when practicable). So, it may be worth popping additional warm clothes into bags.

Next month, your child will bring home a **RED** booklet that needs to be signed each time your child reads to you, a family member or a friend.


All those that complete the RED challenge will be awarded certificates and a prize!
